2	MR. TREVIÑO: Good morning. My name is Memo
3	Treviño. Can everyone hear me okay?
4	(Affirmative response.)
5	MR. TREVIÑO: Perfect. And I am pleased to
6	open the Board meeting of the Texas Department of Motor
7	Vehicles. It is approximately 8:03 a.m., and I'm now
8	calling the Board meeting for April 2, 2020 to order.
9	I want to note for the record that the public
10	notice of this meeting containing all items on the agenda
11	was filed with the Office of the Secretary of State on
12	March 25, 2020.
13	This meeting is being held by telephone
14	conference call in accordance with Texas Government Code
15	Chapter 551, as temporarily modified under Governor Gregg
16	Abbott's authority to suspend certain statutes due to
17	COVID-19.
18	Governor Abbott suspended various provisions of
19	the Texas Open Meetings Act that require government
20	officials and members of the public to be physically
21	present at a specified meeting location. Under that
22	suspension, the public will not be able to physically
23	attend this meeting in person. Instead, the public may
24	attend this meeting by using the link or by calling the
25	toll-free telephone number which are both posted in our
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supplemental agenda which was filed with the Office of the
 Secretary of State on April 1, 2020. All Board members,
 including myself, will be participating remotely via
 WebEx.

5 At this time please mute your phones for the 6 entire duration of this meeting. I am asking our WebEx 7 meeting host, Tameka, to make sure all participants' 8 phones are muted and their video is turned off except for 9 Board members and those who are presenting. Callers will 10 be removed for any disruption, including background.

I would like to remind all participants that this is a telephone conference call meeting. Being held by telephone conference call, there are a few things that will assist in making the meeting run smoother and assist the court reporter in getting an accurate record.

16 Department staff and any commenters should 17 identify themself before speaking. Speak clearly, remember that there may be a slight delay due to the 18 19 telephone conference call meeting, so please wait a little 20 longer than usual before responding to participants. In accordance with department administrative rule, comments to the Board will be limited to three minutes, then the call will be muted. Comments should be pertinent to the issues stated in your email. When addressing the Board, please state your name and affiliation for the record.

Before we begin today, I'd like to remind all presenters and those in attendance of the rules of conduct at our Board meeting. In the department's rules under Section 206.22, the Board chair is given the authority to supervise the conduct of the meeting.

This includes the authority to determine when a speaker is being disruptive of the meeting or is otherwise violating the timing or presentation rules I just discussed. Disruptive speakers with be muted with no warning about disruptive behavior and removed from the

24	All right. The next item is the pledges of
25	allegiance, and we are very fortunate today to have Mr.
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Parker Kuntz, member of Cub Scout Pack 333, and the son of 1 2 Jeremiah Kuntz, our esteemed colleague here at the DMV, 3 who will lead us in the pledges of allegiance. I'd like to ask everybody to stand, and Parker and Jeremiah, will 4 5 you lead us in the pledges of allegiance? 6 MR. Before we got to agenda item 3, I would like to 16 17 say thank you to our wonderful IT staff for ensuring that the meeting link was functioning for today's meeting. 18 19 We now head to agenda item 3, the chair's 20 report. 21 Ladies and gentlemen, I would like to take a 22 moment and reflect on how much the world has changed since 23 our last Board meeting. Out thoughts and prayers go out 24 to everyone affected by the current crisis, and we hope 25 that things will return to normal soon. ON THE RECORD REPORTING (512) 450-0342

I believe this is the first time we've had to 1 2 have a meeting by teleconference. Is that correct? I 3 knew it was possible before, but I'm guessing by the 4 silence it is the first time. We're cutting new trail 5 here, so I would like to thank all the members of the 6 Texas DMV for their diligence, patience, fortitude, and 7 flexibility in maintaining operations during trying times 8 for the citizens of Texas. Everyone's efforts are greatly 9 appreciated. 10 And I would particularly like to recognize the Information Technology Services Division's efforts to 11 rapidly transition more than 85 percent of the agency to 12 13 work from outside our headquarters, giving us the ability 14 to help keep our team safe and yet still keep working for 15 Texans. 16 IT is rarely complimented for keeping things 17 working and is usually only noticed when something stops working, and I think I speak for the Board in 18 19 characterizing their efforts as extraordinary. So thank 20 you very, very much. 21 So cutting new trail here. We will now Okay. 22 go to agenda item 4, our executive director's report. 23 Ms. Brewster, are you ready? 24 MS. BREWSTER: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. For 25 the record, Whitney Brewster, executive director of the ON THE RECORD REPORTING (512) 450-0342

1 department.

2	In light of your recent comments just now, if
3	appropriate, I'd liked to take item 4.B up first, related
4	to the COVID disaster relief response by TxDMV.
5	Uncertainty and anxiousness abound during this
6	global health crisis, and at TxDMV over the last couple of
7	weeks it has been all-consuming to ensure that our agency
8	reduces the risk of exposure to COVID-19 to our employees
9	and to our customers while also continuing to provide the
10	essential services to Texans in order to be able to
11	continue to move forward through these unprecedented
12	times.
13	It has been our goal from the beginning to move
14	as many of our employees to telecommute as we can and to
15	spread out our staff as much as possible who must remain
16	on site to perform vital services.
17	As of March 31, we have 648 of our employees
18	telecommuting with 112 working on site at TxDMV offices
19	throughout the state. Of those, 66 employees are working
20	on site in regional offices. To get this number of people
21	telecommuting in such a short amount of time has been
22	quite amazing to see. I echo the comments by Chairman
23	Treviño: Our IT staff has done an outstanding job.
24	We are tracking absenteeism on a daily basis to
25	determine if COVID-19 is impacting the health of our
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1 workforce. Fortunately, as of now our absenteeism is less 2 than 2 percent of the workforce, which is pretty standard 3 for us.

4 I am happy to say that all of TxDMV is running 5 and operations are continuing, and this is a significant 6 success given the circumstances going on around us. While 7 Camp Hubbard and the regional service centers are 8 presently closed for in-person transactions, we are 9 continuing to provide vital services through the mail, 10 email and phone. We have worked very closely with the Governor's Office on various waivers to assist in the 11 response efforts. 12

Immediately following the governor's disaster declaration on March 13, commercial vehicle registration requirements to travel in and through the State of Texas were temporarily suspended by the order of Governor Abbott, and this was in an effort to make it faster and easier for operators of commercial vehicles to provide COVID-19 relief efforts.

Suspensions apply to the transportation of supplies, medical equipment, and similar materials that are necessary for preparing for or responding to the spread of COVID-19. Additionally, requirements for 72and 144-hour temporary registration permits were also suspended for the commercial motor vehicles that are

1 transporting those needed supplies.

2 On March 16 Governor Abbott also granted a 3 temporary extension to obtain initial registration, 4 renewal of registration, titling and renewal of permanent 5 disabled parking passes. He also granted a temporary 6 extension for an individual with an expired 30-day 7 temporary permit to be able to obtain another permit or 8 Texas registration.

9 Customers certainly can continue to renew their 10 registration online and through the mail, and to be clear, 11 this waiver will remain in effect until 60 days after 12 TxDMV notifies the public that normal services have 13 returned. So once the agency makes that public 14 announcement, customers will have 60 days to come into 15 compliance with those registration requirements.

16 Additionally, in order to assess the fiscal 17 impact of COVID-19, the Legislative Budget Board is asking that all state agencies and universities are estimating 18 19 the costs associated with the response and are required to 20 report any reimbursements received from the federal 21 government or any impacts to our revenue collections as 22 well. So that first report will be provided to the 23 Legislative Budget Board on April 5 and then monthly 24 thereafter.

25

We will also keep the Board up to date with

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that information as well, but I can give you some initial figures at this time. We're still obviously compiling that information, but not including staff time at this point, which is significant, we have spent over \$70,000 on items associated with COVID-19. Primarily associated were things like cleaning services and supplies, as well as headsets and equipment for our telecommuters.

Again, although we're very early on in 9 realizing the impacts of COVID-19 on TxDMV, there are some 10 initial observations that I'd like to share with the 11 Board.

Compared to this time last year, our Consumer Relations Division has seen a decrease in phone calls for the month of March of close to 10 percent at this point, but a 12.6 percent increase in email communication. Our Government and Strategic Communications has seen a huge increase and a positive one through our social media channels as well.

19 Specialty license plate production was 20 monitored on a daily basis, and the March 2020 production 21 is down 30 percent from March of 2019. Specialty license 22 plate production for the last 11 days of March 2020 is 23 down 52 percent from the first 11 days of March 2019. So 24 based on this trend, My Plates expects April sales to be 25 well below forecast, possibly around 50 percent at this

1 point.

1	point.
2	In March 2019 the TxDMV regional service
3	centers collected almost \$15.2 million; however, March
4	2020 we collected roughly \$10.8 million through our
5	offices.
6	On the oversize/overweight permitting front,
7	we've collected almost \$18.2 million in revenue as of this
8	time last year. Those collections are at \$16.4 million
9	for March of this year.
10	Certainly there's more to come on the impacts
11	of COVID-19 on the TxDMV and our revenue forecast, but
12	those are some of the initial observations. I am so
13	extremely appreciative of the TxDMV team in mobilizing so
14	incredibly quickly and being agile in responding to COVID-
15	19 as we all deal with uncertainty and unknowns.
16	Agency staff has been amazing through this
17	process, and I just would be remiss if I did not thank our
18	TxDMV staff for their diligence and work and continuing to
19	serve Texans in this difficult time.
20	And with that, Mr. Chairman, I'd be happy to
21	answer any questions for the Board.
22	MR. TREVIÑO: Great. Thank you very much.
23	Does anybody have any questions?
24	(No response.)
25	MR. TREVIÑO: Please let the record show that I
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speak for the Board and thank you all for your efforts and 1 2 just amazed by what you guys have accomplished in a very 3 short period of time. You guys have been very busy. 4 I would like to also like to thank Jimmy Archer 5 for executing that order by the governor, making sure that 6 it was able to happen and all staff involved in executing 7 that order very quickly, because it impacted the lives of 8 Texans and we appreciate that. So well done. 9 MS. BREWSTER: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. 10 With that, I'll go on back to item 4.A if appropriate. 11 MR. TREVIÑO: Go ahead. 12 13 MS. BREWSTER: Thank you, sir. 14 During the last legislative session, as you 15 know, the Department of Public Safety was directed under 16 their Sunset bill to enter into a third-party contract to 17 examine and make recommendations around the management and operating structure of the driver licensing program, as 18 19 well as opportunities and challenges of transferring the 20 driver licensing program to the Texas Department of Motor Vehicles. 21 22 Just a reminder to those participating in the 23 meeting, the study is due to the legislature no later than 24 September 1 of this year. There was a provision in the 25 bill that if the study is not delivered to the legislature ON THE RECORD REPORTING (512) 450-0342

by September 1 of this year that all of the driver
 licensing functions will be transferred to TxDMV on
 September 1 of 2021.

4 I just wanted to make sure that I provided you 5 with an update as to where we stand today with this 6 important study. DPS has indeed contracted with the 7 University of Texas, as I believe you know, in November of 8 2019, and under that contract a draft of that study is to 9 be submitted to DPS by June of this year, with a final 10 version, as I indicated earlier, being delivered to the legislature no later than September 1 of this year. 11

The kickoff meeting with DPS and UT on the 12 13 study was held on February 6. Since then, Deputy 14 Executive Director Shelly Mellott and I have had the 15 opportunity to have a couple of additional meetings with 16 the University of Texas to discuss the information that we 17 could provide to them that would be useful. An all-day meeting was scheduled for March 27 but, as we all know, 18 19 COVID-19 didn't allow that to proceed, so that meeting was 20 canceled.

I reached out to the Department of Public Safety just yesterday to see if there were any updates on the study. Considering the uncertainty around COVID-19, UT is currently reworking their plan at this point to replace some of those group meetings that they had planned

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for March. They have delayed a few of the deliverables from April 30 to May 31 to accommodate those changes, and at this point there is no plan to push out the final delivery of the report.

5 To date we have provided a significant amount 6 of information to UT, including items around our key 7 performance indicators, wait times, call volume, customer 8 satisfaction, as well as the transition plan that was put 9 together for establishing TxDMV.

10 The driver licensing study remains a very high priority for agency staff, who will continue to provide 11 information to UT and DPS to assist in this effort. We'll 12 13 also continue to keep state leadership, as well as this 14 Board, in the loop as we proceed. There's a lot to do in 15 a short amount of time, but TxDMV will do all that we can 16 within our control to provide the information that UT 17 needs to be able to do a study that meets the expectations of the legislature. 18

With that, Mr. Chairman, I would be happy to answer any questions that Board members have. MR. TREVIÑO: Okay. Thanks a lot, Whitney. Any questions? (No response.) MS. BREWSTER: All right. Hearing none, Mr. Chairman, I will go to the last item, item 4.C. You can

1 find a memo on page 7 of your board books. 2 I wanted to provide to you some positive news this morning. We have hired a chief information officer 3 4 for the department. Butch Grote joined the TxDMV on March 5 23 of 2020. I'll tell you it had to have been the 6 strangest first day on the job that he has ever 7 experienced. He joined us when much of headquarters had 8 already moved to telecommuting, including many of his new 9 staff. 10 But I'll tell you Butch is a seasoned IT professional, he has over 35 years of experience managing 11 12 IT staff and projects, as well as operations at multiple 13 state agencies. 14 Prior to joining the TxDMV team, he served as 15 the CIO for the Department of Agriculture, he earned a 16 bachelor's in computer science and management from St. 17 Edward's, and he serves on various information technology boards. He's very well connected to other state CIOs, and 18 19 he's certainly hit the ground running. I look forward to 20 introducing you to him very soon when we all can come 21 together again. 22 I do want to thank very much Wendy Barron, our

deputy CIO, for stepping in to the CIO role during an extremely critical time for our agency. She was really thrown into the deep end after only being with the agency

for about three months. She led us through some very 1 2 complex times, and she's absolutely critical in steering 3 our IT team through the COVID-19 response.

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As the chairman said earlier, our IT team has been outstanding in their support. What they did really helped our employees significantly reduce their exposure to COVID-19, and we really owe a tremendous thank you to 8 Wendy.

9 With that, some other organizational changes I 10 just wanted to make sure that I mentioned to the Board. There have been significant changes to the department that 11 12 have occurred over the last ten years, including 13 additional statutory responsibilities and functions, and 14 it is imperative that we work with the organizational 15 structure to make sure that we best position ourselves for 16 the future.

As such, I am proposing to add two additional 17 positions to the department, an additional deputy director 18 19 position, as well as an ombudsman position. No action is 20 necessary from Board members at this time; however, 21 certainly if there is any feedback, those comments are 22 welcome.

23 The TxDMV organizational assessment project, 24 the organizational preparation working group, considered 25 various changes to the department's structure to increase

1 its effectiveness and its efficiency. The working group 2 considered information from multiple sources, including 3 results from agency staff on areas where we can improve, 4 and this working group recommended organizational changes 5 that support the changes that I am proposing.

6 Specifically the working group suggested the 7 creation of a deputy executive director to oversee the 8 support functions of the department, as well as an 9 ombudsman position to assist all employees with conflict 10 resolution and maintaining a positive culture at the 11 agency.

And a brief description of these positions can be found in my memo on page 7, but by making these changes, greater alignment, coordination, and scalability of TxDMV operations can be achieved. Also, issues can be addressed in a more timely fashion and at the appropriate level of the organization, and capacity for a greater strategic purpose will be added.

19 The recruitment efforts for these positions can 20 begin immediately. Existing positions, as well as a 21 funding source within TxDMV's existing budget have been 22 identified, and we've also identified mechanisms for 23 bringing on new staff remotely.

Fortunately, just as an example, we had 11 new employees start just yesterday at the agency using our new

remote process. The projected date for having these two 1 2 critical positions filled is July of 2020. 3 Thank you, Mr. Chairman. That concludes my 4 briefing, and I'd be happy to answer any questions that 5 the Board has. 6 MR. TREVIÑO: Thank you, Whitney. 7 Does the Board have any questions for the 8 director on this? 9 Whitney, this is John Prewitt. MR. PREWITT: 10 MR. TREVIÑO: John, Member Washburn had her hand up first, so I think I'm going to defer to her. 11 MS. WASHBURN: Thank you. This is Member 12 13 Washburn. 14 This might be a rhetorical question in these 15 crazy times right now, but do you think is there any risk 16 of us losing budget to do something like this, given the 17 state of the stimulus package and the drain on the U.S. and the State of Texas? 18 19 MS. BREWSTER: That's a great question, Member 20 Washburn, and certainly one that has been front and center 21 in my mind. 22 We started this process well before COVID-19 23 hit, but I still do believe that these positions are 24 necessary now more than ever in light of our rapidly 25 changing environment. ON THE RECORD REPORTING (512) 450-0342

At this point we have been able to identify the 1 2 funding in our existing budget. The TxDMV Fund, which is 3 our funding source, at this point is still very strong; however, there are still a number of unknowns in terms of 4 5 what state leadership at this point is going to want 6 agencies to move forward with as we move into budgeting 7 for the next biennium, and that would be the 22-23 8 biennium. 9 MS. WASHBURN: Thank you. 10 MR. TREVIÑO: Thank you for that question, Member Washburn. 11 12 John, Member Prewitt. MR. PREWITT: I would just echo Member 13 14 Washburn's question. I had the same line of questioning 15 for the executive director, so that question has been 16 answered. Thank you. 17 MR. TREVIÑO: Great. Member Gillman. 18 19 MS. GILLMAN: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. 20 Whitney, I'm concerned about the ombudsman position. You said it's for conflict resolution. 21 Ι 22 didn't really know that we had a problem with conflict 23 resolution now. Tell me why this position is needed. MS. BREWSTER: So a lot of times there are 24 25 opportunities for issues to be resolved between two ON THE RECORD REPORTING (512) 450-0342

employees, and it does not necessarily need to rise to the 1 2 level of executive management, which sometimes happens now, and if we can have an ombudsman to help facilitate 3 4 those types of conversations between employees or between 5 employees and management, we can deal with them at that level so that we can then make sure that those things 6 7 progress in a timely fashion at the source. 8 This position would also be critical as our 9 ethics advisor to the department, the agency staff, as 10 well as the Board, in providing training and answering questions about issues around ethics. 11 12 Thank you for your answer. MS. GILLMAN: Ι 13 will absorb that. 14 MR. TREVIÑO: Okay. So great. So Member 15 Gillman, are you okay with that answer? 16 MS. GILLMAN: Yes. MR. TREVIÑO: 17 Okay. Do you have any other questions? 18 19 MS. GILLMAN: No, sir. Thank you. 20 MR. TREVIÑO: Great. Thank you very much. 21 Whitney, I would agree definitely with Member 22 Prewitt and Member Washburn if these positions coming on 23 board that you've already got the funds for and you've got 24 the recommendations to hire these, if they are going to 25 make you more efficient going down the road to put this ON THE RECORD REPORTING (512) 450-0342

agency in a better position in the future to run more efficiently, I think they're great hires, because to Member Washburn's and Member Prewitt's point, and I think to Member Gillman's as well, the budget for the state will be dramatically impacted by the events going on around us

And I do want to compliment you and your staff for already thinking about the future, because to think that this agency won't be asked to also make sacrifices to make sure that we continue to be a well run state and pay our bills and everything else is not realistic.

The budget is going to be very, very severely impacted by all the things that we're seeing, the rising unemployment -- the unemployment claims this morning were incredibly high -- oil prices, all the things that everybody is well aware of.

16 So if these positions are going to help you 17 going forward and make you a better administrator and able to handle the changes that will definitely need to be made 18 19 going forward, I think that they're good hires. But the 20 overall budget picture going forward, from everything that I've heard does not look good, so bear that in mind. 21 22 MS. BREWSTER: Thank you, Mr. Chairman and 23 members. 24 MR. TREVIÑO: Is there any other questions for 25 Whitney, for Executive Director Brewster, or any other

1 comments? 2 (No response.) MR. TREVIÑO: Great. 3 4 So, Butch, welcome aboard. 5 And, Wendy, thank you very much for stepping in 6 and filling the gap and doing a great job. We really 7 appreciate your efforts. 8 So with that, Executive Director Brewster, are 9 you done with your report? 10 MS. BREWSTER: Yes, sir. That concludes my report. Thank you. 11 12 MR. TREVIÑO: Thank you. So I think we're headed to the next agenda 13 14 item, which is regarding contested case rules under 15 Chapter 215. I will now turn it over to our general counsel, Tracey Beaver. 16 17 MS. BEAVER: Chairman, members, Ms. Brewster, good morning. For the record, I am Tracey Beaver, general 18 19 counsel. 20 Today I'm presenting informal rules that address contested cases for posting to the department's 21 22 website for public comment. This informal rule is listed 23 on your agenda as item 5, and the details of these rule 24 changes may be found starting on page 10 of your board 25 book. ON THE RECORD REPORTING (512) 450-0342

This informal working draft implements Section 1 2.06 of Senate Bill 604. This section of Senate Bill 604 2 3 amended the Occupations Code Section 2301.709 by adding subsection (d), that requires the Board to establish standards and rules and policies for reviewing contested cases.

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7 The Board previously adopted policies on 8 contested cases in February of 2019. These informal rules 9 reflect the department's current practice that department 10 staff will notify parties to a case at least two weeks prior to the Board meeting of the parties' opportunity to 11 be present. 12

The rules specify clear expectations limiting 13 14 arguments and discussion to evidence in the record of the 15 contested case hearing held by the administrative law 16 judge. The rules address a prohibition on ex parte 17 communications, and the requirement that Board members may use their industry expertise to help them understand the 18 19 case and make effective decisions; however, Board members 20 are not advocates for a particular industry.

Also, in this informal working draft response 21 22 to a petition for rulemaking submitted by Mr. Crocker 23 requesting in part that parties to a contested case be 24 given 20 minutes to present. In the past year the Board 25 has consistently given parties to contested cases 15

1 minutes to present their case, including 5 minutes for 2 rebuttal.

3 The Board has discretion whether to allow 4 parties to present their case. These rules preserve the 5 Board's discretion by not requiring a set time frame for 6 all contested case presentations. Contested cases vary in 7 complexity, and the parties to a contested case do not 8 always need the full 15 minutes to present their case. 9 The department is requesting your approval to 10 proceed with posting this informal working draft and recommends a 30-day informal comment period from the date 11 of posting. 12 Members, this concludes my remarks. 13 I'm happy 14 to answer any questions the Board has on this informal 15 rule. Thank you. 16 MR. TREVIÑO: Thank you, Tracey. 17 Does anybody have any questions for our general counsel? 18 19 Member Graham. 20 MR. GRAHAM: Tracey, do we know who worked on these informal rules? Were they just brought by Mr. 21 22 Crocker himself, or was there a group that worked on them? 23 MS. BEAVER: Tracey Beaver, general counsel, for the record. 24 25 There was a group of folks at the department ON THE RECORD REPORTING (512) 450-0342

that worked on these rules, including the Motor Vehicle 1 2 Division, Enforcement and some staff in the General Counsel's Office reviewing Mr. Crocker's petition for 3 4 rulemaking, as well as the legislation that passed this 5 prior session in order to implement that legislation. A working group of staff at the department got 6 7 together to create this informal working draft, which is 8 something that we would post on our website prior to the 9 formal rulemaking process of proposal. 10 MR. GRAHAM: Okay. Thank you. MR. TREVIÑO: And General Counsel Beaver, a lot 11 of these recommendations were from Sunset. Is that 12 13 correct? 14 MS. BEAVER: Yes, Chairman, that's correct. 15 The Sunset Advisory Commission staff report with final 16 results did also recommend these rules be adopted, and 17 then the Senate Bill 604 is a legislation that we're implementing and developing these rules that are 18 19 consistent with department policy. 20 MR. TREVIÑO: Right. Okay. Thank you. 21 Does anybody have any further questions for 22 General Counsel Beaver? 23 (No response.) 24 MR. TREVIÑO: All right. So hearing none, the 25 chair would entertain a motion, if anyone happens to have ON THE RECORD REPORTING (512) 450-0342

And 20 I'll give a little bit of background about what this is to 21 give some context. 22 Currently a motor vehicle sale that has 23 occurred in an automobile dealership can be canceled, 24 rescinded, or revoked if the deal falls through. If both 25 parties agree that they are not interested in the sale ON THE RECORD REPORTING (512) 450-0342

1 going through, then a licensed motor vehicle dealer can 2 send an affidavit in to the department with both parties agreeing that the sale was undone, and the department will 3 4 remove that record from the title system. 5 Right now the administrative rules provide 21 6 days for a dealer to submit an affidavit in order for that 7 sale to be undone, and what is happening right now is that 8 dealers will get past the 21 days, the deal will fall 9 through, both parties agree, but they've gone beyond the time limit allowed for in our administrative rule, and 10 they have to go to court in order for that deal to be 11 undone. 12 So in order to reduce the burdens that the 13 14 department has and the courts have of having to hear these 15 cases, the department is proposing to extend the time 16 frame that a dealer has to submit this to the department 17 to 90 days from the date of initial sale to allow more time for that deal to be consummated. 18 And with that, I'm more than happy to answer 19 20 any questions. 21 MR. TREVIÑO: Thank you, Mr. Kuntz. 22 Are there any questions for Mr. Kuntz? 23 Member Gillman. 24 MS. GILLMAN: I just wanted to say that this 25 proposal is very welcome and certainly rescissions, ON THE RECORD REPORTING

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cancellations, revocations of automobile transactions are 1 2 not the best, but having to go to court when both parties 3 agree it needs to be backed out is burdensome, timely and 4 expensive, and so this proposal is really welcome and 5 appreciated. 6 MR. TREVIÑO: Thank you for those comments, 7 Member Gillman. It's good to hear, very good to hear. 8 Any other comments or questions for Mr. Kuntz? 9 (No response.) 10 MR. TREVIÑO: Tracey, are there any comments from the public? 11 12 MS. BEAVER: Tracey Beaver, general counsel, 13 for the record. 14 No comments have been received from the public. 15 MR. TREVIÑO: And, Tracey, just going forward 16 I'm just going to dispense with asking you for that, but 17 if you have any comments, please break in and just let us know that there are comments. 1 is number 8, and please get started. 2 MR. KUNTZ: All right. For the record, Jeremiah Kuntz, director of the Vehicle Titles and 3 4 Registration Division. 5 Before you is agenda item number 8, again 6 proposal for public comment. These are amendments to --7 and I'll read these off -- 217.22, 217.27, 217.32, 217.38, 8 217.41, 217.55 and new Sections 217.58 through 217.64. 9 These proposed rules are relating to legislation that 10 passed in our Sunset bill, Senate Bill 604, during the 11 86th Legislative Session relating to the issuance of 12 digital license plates in Texas. And before I really get into the actual rule, I 13 14 know there were some questions at the last Board meeting 15 about what is a digital license plate, and so I'll do my best to kind of describe what we have seen from the vendor 16 17 community as it relates to digital license plates. If you will, a digital license plate, as the 18 name would suggest, it is a digital piece of hardware, 19 somewhat like a Kindle or an iPad that is the same size as 20 21 a license plate and they are affixed to the rear of the 22 vehicle. According to state law, you can have one digital 23 license plate displayed on the vehicle, and if the vehicle 24 requires two license plate, then the front license plate 25 would then be the metal license plate.

These license plates are digital in nature and 1 2 can be dynamically changed through the vendor's software. So we know that there are vendors that provide this 3 4 technology and they have systems in the back-end that will 5 allow them to update the image that is displayed on the 6 license plate, and so most of what we see kind of from 7 this industry is the ability to display that the vehicle 8 has current registration or that the registration has 9 expired. You can actually put the word "Expired" across 10 the license plate.

The technology generally also has other 11 features that could potentially be options in there, such 12 as GPS tracking devices for the customer to be able to see 13 14 where that vehicle is traveling, so if it's on a 15 commercial vehicle, the commercial carrier could 16 potentially track their fleet of vehicles using that GPS 17 technology, and the vendor's software would then provide the customer with that kind of information. 18

We've also seen that they have a potential functionality to interface with toll roads through RFID chips that are embedded in the systems, or potentially, if there are cities that have parking meters that use RFID technology, that you could potentially pay for parking with the license plate.

But at its essence, these are digital displays

1	used in lieu of the metal license plate that is currently
2	on the vehicle. And I'll answer any questions about what
3	a digital license plate is, and then I can go into the
4	rules.
5	MR. TREVIÑO: The chair recognizes Member
6	Gillman.
7	MS. GILLMAN: Mr. Kuntz, tell me the difference
8	in cost.
9	MR. KUNTZ: So we know of some costs that we've
10	seen from vendors, just doing internet searches, it looks
11	like it ranges between 6- and \$800 for a digital license
12	plate. The customer would actually pay the license plate
13	provider for the license plate separate and apart from the
14	department, so we would not be selling the license plates
15	directly. They would obtain them from the vendor, and
16	then the vendor's software would interface with the
17	registration and titling system. So it would not be the
18	State that's purchasing the license plate; the customers
19	would purchase them, and they look like they're about 6-
20	to \$800.
21	MS. GILLMAN: Thank you.
22	Mr. Chairman, is it okay if I have a comment,
23	or am I limited to questions?
24	MR. TREVIÑO: Tracey, stop me if I'm wrong.
25	She can comment, I think. Right?
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MS. GILLMAN: I guess I'm a little bit old 1 2 fashioned. It seems like metal plates are pretty 3 reliable, inexpensive, and they work 100 percent of the 4 time. I've never seen a digital license plate but it kind 5 of seems like even though I know technology is a good 6 thing and I don't want to be anti-technology, but the 7 metal plates are so reliable and easy, I'm not sure that 8 we need to do this. 9 MR. TREVIÑO: Well, I think the big thing there is we'll let the market decide. And that's the great 10 thing about the State of Texas, you know, the market will 11 12 decide. If there's a market for them, people will buy 13 them; if they don't, then they'll just sit on the shelf. 14 So I think our job is not necessarily to opine on whether 15 this is a good one or a bad one, it's just to facilitate 16 them getting up and running. 17 Well, if it works. MS. GILLMAN: MR. TREVIÑO: Right, exactly. Yes. 18 19 MR. KUNTZ: So, Chairman, if you'd like me to 20 try and address those, I'm more than happy to. 21 There are a couple of states that are currently 22 using these. California has digital license plates on the 23 roadway, Arizona has some on the roadway as well, and so 24 they are at least a proven technology in that they have 25 been able to be put on the roadway for use. I think

1 there's always the long-term look at these as to how they 2 hold up over time. We look at that with our metal license 3 plates as well.

But as the chairman has indicated, the legislature has seen that this is something that they would like to provide Texans with the option of, and it is an option for Texans on whether or not they would like to obtain them.

9 We have no requirements for any person to 10 purchase one of these license plates. They still have the 11 option of having the metal license plates, and in fact, 12 they would receive a set of metal license plates. In the 13 situation that the digital license plate fails, they would 14 have a set of license plates that they could put back on 15 their vehicle in that situation.

16MR. TREVIÑO: Member Washburn, you're up next.17Member Gillman, are you done?18MS. GILLMAN: (Inaudible response.)

19 MR. TREVIÑO: Great.

20 Member Washburn, sorry about making you wait.
21 MS. WASHBURN: No worries.

Just a quick question. What's our expected take rate on this, and does it affect us at all if it's a high take rate or a low take rate?

MR. KUNTZ: So definitely we've looked at what

the kind of market penetration would be for folks that would want to purchase these. I believe that in the state of California early on they had about 1,300 of them or so on the roadways. I think that's gone up slightly from there.

We did look at that -- and one of the things that's in this rule is actually an administrative fee for a customer that opts to have one of these license plates of \$95, and that is in order to recoup the cost of programming our system to interface with the vendor's system.

And so we were using that market penetration kind of as a basis from California to try and run some of our estimates. You know, we're estimating about 1,500 in the beginning. It's anyone's guess at this point with a new technology coming into the market, but that was our best guess looking at what happened in California.

MS. WASHBURN: So 1,500 would cover our cost? 18 19 MR. KUNTZ: It would cover our cost. We 20 amortized that out, I believe we did a 15-year amortization in order to spread that cost out over the 21 22 years, and so if we had about 1,500 and spread it out over 23 the 15 years at \$95, I believe it would cover our cost. 24 MS. WASHBURN: Okay. Thank you. 25 MR. TREVIÑO: Thank you, Member Washburn.

Member Bacarisse. Member Bacarisse, did you 1 have a comment? You had your hand up. No? Okay. Great. 2 3 All right. So any other questions for Mr. 4 Kuntz? 5 (No response.) 6 MR. TREVIÑO: Hearing none, then the chair 7 would entertain a motion. Anybody out there want to take 8 this one. 9 MR. BACARISSE: Mr. Chairman. 10 MR. TREVIÑO: Yes, Member Bacarisse. MR. BACARISSE: I'd like to move that the Board 11 12 approve the proposed digital license plate rules in agenda item number 8 for publication in the Texas Register for 13 14 public comment. 15 MR. 24	Are you counting my vote? No, I think I did
25	not count my vote. I voted in favor. Thank you, Tracey,
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1 for catching that one there. So I voted in favor, so I 2 believe it's eight to one. Is that correct? 3 MS. BEAVER: Chairman, it's Tracey Beaver, general counsel, for the record. 4 5 That's the count that I have as well. 6 MR. TREVIÑO: Thank you very much. 7 We'll now move to agenda item number 9, again 8 from Mr. Jeremiah Kuntz. 9 MR. KUNTZ: You've got me all morning here. 10 Again for the record, director of the Vehicle Titles and Registration Division. 11 12 Before you, members, is agenda item number 9, which is amendments to Section 217.182 in the Texas 13 14 Administrative Code. These rules are related to House 15 Bill 1548 and the issuance of a license plate to 16 off-highway vehicles. 17 If you'll remember, we did actually pass rules related to off-highway vehicles very recently, and this 18 19 was an oversight on our behalf. We passed the fee for the 20 off-highway license plates of \$10, and one of the things that we neglected to take care of in that rule was a 21 22 change to the processing and handling fee to make sure 23 that we included this license plate type in the list of 24 license plates that are required to pay the processing and 25 handling fee.

This is important for the county tax 1 2 assessor-collectors who issue these license plates, as 3 well as the department. The processing and handling fee 4 covers the cost of administration for those county tax 5 assessor-collector offices, as well as our department, 6 for the issuance of those license plates, and so we would 7 be seeking your consideration of these rules. 8 MR. TREVIÑO: Any further comments for Mr. 9 Any comments from the public? Kuntz? 10 (No response.) MR. TREVIÑO: Hearing none, the chair would 11 entertain a motion. 12 Member Washburn. 13 14 MS. WASHBURN: I move that the Board approve 15 the proposed amendments to Section 217.182 for publication 16 in the Texas Register for public comment. 17 MR. TREVIÑO: Great. Thank you. Do we have a second? 18 MR. RICHARDSON: I'll second. 19 MR. TREVIÑO: Member Richardson. 20 Any further discussion? 21 22 (No response.) MR. TREVIÑO: Hearing none, I'll call for the 23 24 vote. All those in favor, please signify by raising your 25 right hand. ON THE RECORD REPORTING (512) 450-0342

(A show of hands.) 1 2 MR. TREVIÑO: And this one looks like it passes 3 unanimously, nine votes for. 4 Okay. We're now on to agenda item 10, and 5 again Mr. Jeremiah Kuntz. 6 MR. KUNTZ: Good morning. For the record, Jeremiah Kuntz, director of the Vehicle Titles and 7 8 Registration Division. 9 Before you is agenda item number 10. These 10 rules are for final adoption, and I believe that these are 11 a long time coming. These rules are related to the 12 assembled-vehicle bill that passed during the last legislative session that this Board and the department 13 14 have been working a very long time to come to this point. 15 So these amendments are amendments to 217.3 and 16 217.141 through 217.143; new Subchapter L, which is 17 217.401 through 217.407. These relate to House Bill 1755, the title and registration for assembled vehicles, House 18 19 Bill 3171, motor-driven cycles, which were in 20 Transportation Code 501.036 and 501.037 related to farm 21 trailers, farm semitrailers, trailers, semitrailers and 22 house trailers. 23 All right. That was a mouthful. 24 Members, as I said, we have worked in the 25 department for quite some time to get to this point, and ON THE RECORD REPORTING (512) 450-0342

we've had lots of interactions with stakeholders on these rules to make sure that we addressed all of the concerns that have been raised by the stakeholders, legislative members, and various others.

5 So I'm not going to spend a whole lot of time 6 going into great detail on this, but we did post these for 7 public comment on December 20, 2019; the comment period 8 closed on January 21, 2020. We also had a public hearing 9 at our last Board meeting where we heard from various 10 stakeholders to hear their concerns in person.

The department received written comments 11 requesting changes to the proposed text from -- and I'll 12 list these off -- the Assembled Vehicle Coalition of 13 14 Texas; Lamar County Tax Assessor-Collector; the Lubbock 15 County Tax Assessor-Collector; the Specialty Equipment 16 Marketing Association, otherwise known as SEMA; the 17 Tarrant County Regional Auto Crimes Task Force; the Tax Assessor-Collectors Association of Texas; Texas Automobile 18 19 Dealers Association; and the Recreational Vehicle Association; as well as an individual. 20

We have reviewed all of the comments received. We were able to make a majority of the comments changes to our rule to accommodate those comments, and also provided clarification to some of the comments because we believed there was just a misunderstanding on the interpretation of

1 the way the rule was written.

2	And I believe if you remember during our public
3	hearing, a member representing the Assembled Vehicle
4	Coalition of Texas stood up and said that we had had a
5	conversation and that he was good based on that
6	conversation of the interpretation that we had.
7	We also made changes for the Tax Assessor-
8	Collectors Association. They had requested that they be
9	removed from the initial application. The way that this
10	process will work is a person who has assembled a vehicle
11	will make application to the department first for review.
12	The department will review all of the
13	documentation that that individual has provided, we will
14	provide them with a response letter and a list of all of
15	the items that need to be taken to the county tax
16	assessor-collector's office for the final titling of these
17	vehicles.
18	So the tax assessor-collectors were originally
19	listed as one of the intake points for that initial
20	application. They requested to be removed from that so
21	that all the applications come in directly to the
22	department and that we provide that list in the letter
23	that the customer receives so that the tax assessor-
24	collector and the customer both have a clear understanding
25	of what information needs to be brought in for the titling
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1 in their office.

2	We provided clarification. There was, I guess,
3	a misunderstanding from the Auto Crimes Task Force about
4	the use of motor numbers and requested that we issue motor
5	numbers. We do issue motor numbers when that is the
6	identifying number on a vehicle, and that generally
7	applies to very old vehicles prior to VIN numbers being
8	stamped on the body, and so that is something that we do
9	consider, and we just provided clarification on that.
10	SEMA also had similar comments to those made by
11	the Assembled Vehicle Coalition of Texas related to the
12	definitions of systems, and based on our explanation we
13	believe that we are in line with where they wanted that
14	definition to be, and so we've not made any changes to the
15	rule related to that, just because we believe that our
16	interpretation of those definitions is in alignment with
17	what they are interpreting as well.
18	With that, I am more than happy to answer any
19	questions that you may have on the rules.
20	MR. TREVIÑO: Great. Member Gillman.
21	MS. GILLMAN: Jeremiah, for my clarification,
22	is there going to be a VIN number on the body?
23	MR. KUNTZ: Yes. We will allow for a couple of
24	different numbers to serve as the VIN number. If it's a
25	kit car that's been produced by a manufacturer of kit cars
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and they have assigned a number to that particular kit, we 1 2 would allow that to serve as the VIN number. 3 If they need a VIN number, then they would 4 apply to the department the way that folks do today for 5 the department to issue a VIN or reassign a VIN. And so, 6 yes, we would assign a VIN number to those vehicles that 7 would be affixed to the body of the vehicle if they do not 8 have one already. 9 Now, if they are using parts from various other 10 vehicles, they've taken a donor vehicle, if you will, we would need to assign a number to those vehicles, because 11 the VIN number from that original donor vehicle should not 12 be used for the assembled vehicle. 13 14 MS. GILLMAN: Right. And I don't know what was 15 TADA's comment that they posted. Did you address that? So they made a comment 16 MR. KUNTZ: 17 particularly related to what a definition of a hobbyist is and how the department would determine who a hobbyist is. 18 19 Obviously there's no regulatory scheme for a hobbyist, there's not a license or an identification document that's 20 21 issued to somebody who's a hobbyist. 22 But the way we've addressed this is we review 23 these documents -- and that's part of the process that I 24 just laid out earlier -- the applicant would make 25 application to the department, we review those documents ON THE RECORD REPORTING (512) 450-0342

1	today, and we would review them the same way we do today
2	for vehicles that fall into this category.
3	A misnomer right now is that prior to this
4	assembled vehicles could not be titled in Texas, and we
5	actually do title assembled vehicles in Texas today.
6	Applicants make those applications and we review them and
7	we make those determinations based on the information
8	provided.
9	So if we see things that are not in alignment
10	with what we would believe a hobbyist to be, if it looks
11	like it came from a manufacturer or somebody who is
12	regularly producing these vehicles, then we would take
13	action on those.
14	We would refer those either to law enforcement
15	if we believe there's a violation, or to our Enforcement
16	Division if we believe there's a violation that these
17	entities should be a licensed manufacturer.
18	MS. GILLMAN: I thought that there was a
19	rule and please clarify for me that a hobbyist was
20	someone that built a vehicle for personal use or not more
21	than I can't remember the number: three, five?
22	MR. KUNTZ: Five.
23	MS. GILLMAN: Five. Is that a correct
24	definition of a hobbyist, for personal use or not more
25	than five?
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MR. KUNTZ: Yes. So between statute and this 1 2 administrative rule, we have interpreted a hobbyist to be 3 somebody who is building an assembled vehicle for personal 4 use and not for continuous sale, and we have defined 5 continuous sale as not more than five vehicles. 6 MS. GILLMAN: Thank you. That makes me feel 7 better that they're not a manufacturer. Thank you. 8 MR. TREVIÑO: Thank you, Member Gillman. 9 Any other questions for Mr. Kuntz? 10 (No response.) MR. TREVIÑO: I would just like to add that 11 12 this is agenda item number 10, but it's not like agenda item number 8 or number 7. The amount of labor and amount 13 14 of effort that has gone into trying to get different 15 stakeholders to opine on this and get it into a workable 16 document has been astounding. 17 Jeremiah, how many person hours do you think we've invested in this? 18 19 MR. KUNTZ: We tried to do some back of the 20 napkin. It's hundreds of hours; I would say it's north of 21 500 hours that we've spent working on this. 22 MR. TREVIÑO: And that's staff but then also 23 the general public and other people who are interested in 24 this have also contributed a lot to get this to a form 25 that is workable so we can get Texans out there having fun ON THE RECORD REPORTING (512) 450-0342

and doing what they need to do but protect our roadways and the citizens of Texas, the safety of the citizens of Texas. I would just like to thank you for putting in so much hard work on it.

5 MR. KUNTZ: Thank you. You know, obviously I 6 did not do this alone. I would be remiss if I didn't 7 thank my staff, particularly Clint Thompson. He worked 8 tirelessly on this. He's got a staff of folks also that 9 work with him, what we refer to as our planners.

They've put in numerous amounts of hours to work on this, as well as our General Counsel's Office. Chris Harrigan was the attorney that worked with us on drafting these rules, and I know he's put in lots and lots of hours putting this rule package together.

15 So, yes, I'm just the person here presenting it 16 today. They did a lot of that back-end work, and I really 17 appreciate all the efforts that they've put into this.

18 MR. TREVIÑO: And thank Parker, because you 19 probably missed some Cub Scout meetings, and everybody 20 else in Cub Scouts out there who were impacted by this, 21 thank you.

Any further comments for Mr. Kuntz?
MS. GILLMAN: Good job, Mr. Kuntz. Thank you.
MR. TREVIÑO: High praise there, Mr. Kuntz,
that's high praise.

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1 So any other comments? 2 (No response.) MR. TREVIÑO: Hearing none, the chair would 3 entertain a motion. 4 5 MR. PREWITT: Mr. Chairman, this is Member 6 Prewitt. I'd like to move that the Board approve the 7 adoption of agenda item 10, amendments to Section 217.3 8 and 217.141 through 217.143 and new Subchapter L, as 9 recommended by staff. MR. TREVIÑO: Great. We have a motion from 10 Member Prewitt. 11 Do we have a second? 12 MS. WASHBURN: This is Member Washburn. I'd 13 14 like to second. MR. TREVIÑO: A second from Member Washburn. 15 16 Any further discussion? 17 MR. TREVIÑO: Hearing none, I call for the vote. All those in favor, please signify by raising your 18 19 hand. 20 (A show of hands.) 21 MR. TREVIÑO: Great. It looks like we have nine votes for. Motion carries. 22 23 Anyone against? 24 (No response.) 25 MR. TREVIÑO: None. The motion passes ON THE RECORD REPORTING (512) 450-0342

unanimously. Thank you very much. 1 2 So on the advice of general counsel, we will take a brief five-minute break before jumping back into 3 the specialty license plate portion of the meeting. 4 5 So Tracey, what is the process, just mute our 6 camera and our mic? 7 MS. BEAVER: Yes. If everyone would please make sure your line is muted and your camera is off, and 8 9 then you can let everybody know what time we'll return. MR. TREVIÑO: We'll be back in five minutes. 10 It is right now 9:17, so what is that, 9:22. 11 12 (Whereupon, a brief recess was taken.) MR. TREVIÑO: Today is Thursday, 4/2/2020. 13 I 14 quess we're back in session, so Tameka, could you turn the 15 video back on, or what do we need to do to make that 16 happen? I don't have an icon that allows me to turn it 17 back on. MR. PREWITT: Tameka is supposed to be running 18 19 the meeting. Is Tameka there? 20 MS. BEAVER: This is Tracey Beaver, general counsel for the record. 21 22 Tameka is hosting the meeting, and she is 23 getting the icon to pop back up for everybody. It looks 24 like mine just came back on. So if you could click "Start 25 my video" only if you're a Board member. Thank you. ON THE RECORD REPORTING (512) 450-0342

MR. TREVIÑO: It seems like we're back on. 1 So 2 again, I will repeat, for the record my name is Guillermo 3 Treviño. It is approximately 9:24 a.m. on 4/2/2020, and this meeting is back in session. 4 5 Tracey, is there anything else I have to say to 6 make sure that we're back in session? 7 MS. BEAVER: No. That's sufficient. Thank 8 you, Chairman. 9 MR. TREVIÑO: Great. So it's been 10 approximately five minutes since we've seen or heard from Mr. Kuntz, so I think it's high time that we hear from him 11 12 again. We'll now move to briefing and action items. 13 14 Mr. Kuntz will brief us on agenda items 11.A, B and C 15 regarding specialty license plate design. 16 MR. KUNTZ: Great. Thank you, Mr. Chairman. 17 For the record, Jeremiah Kuntz, director of the Vehicle Titles and Registration Division. 18 19 And before I go on, as we were on break I 20 thought about it and I thanked all my staff for that last agenda item. I think it's appropriate that we also thank 21 22 a gentleman in the public who worked pretty tirelessly on 23 this. Farron Smith is the head of the Assembled Vehicle 24 Coalition of Texas, and he put in a lot of hours, I know, 25 on his side to get that legislation passed with his ON THE RECORD REPORTING (512) 450-0342

1 membership, and so I think it would be appropriate that we 2 thank him.

3 He's actually a member on one of our advisory 4 committees, and so we continue to work with him going 5 forward on the Vehicle Titles and Registration Committee, 6 and so I think that it's appropriate to thank him and 7 everybody who worked on his side to get that through the 8 legislation. 9 MR. TREVIÑO: Hear, hear. 10 MR. KUNTZ: With that, I will present to you agenda item number 11. For your consideration are three 11 specialty plate redesigns, and so these are license plates 12 13 that have already been on the road. 14 And in your board book, since we're doing this 15 via vide teleconference -- normally there would be a 16 poster board that has the license plates that sits there 17 so you can see them. We've tried to blow up some images in your board book so that you can see the side by sides 18 19 of the current design and the redesign. We did post 20 these, as we do all license plates, for eView on our

21 website in February of 2020.

The first license plate is the Auburn University license plate. We received 236 people that liked the plate the new plate design, 80 people that did not. None of these plates received negative comments, but

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you kind of vote with I like it or a I don't like it. 1 The 2 next one was Florida State. It received 121 people that 3 liked the new design, 77 that did not. And the Dallas 4 Cowboys new design, 208 people liked the new design and 55 5 didn't. 6 And so you can see all three of those license 7 plates, and I'm not sure if the Board was going to try and 8 take them all up at one time or individual, but I leave 9 those for your consideration. MR. TREVIÑO: Great. Unless there's any kind 10 11 of comments or concerns from the Board, we'll take them 12 all up as one item. Are there any comments from Board 13 members? 14 (No response.) 15 MR. TREVIÑO: No? All right. Then the chair would entertain a motion. 16 17 MS. McRAE: Mr. Chairman, I'll make a motion. Member McRae. 18 19 MR. TREVIÑO: Please. 20 MS. McRAE: I would like to make a motion for agenda items 11.A through C. I move that the Board 21 22 approve the Auburn and Florida State universities and 23 Dallas Cowboys specialty plate redesigns. 24 MR. TREVIÑO: Thank you, Member McRae. 25 Do we have a second? ON THE RECORD REPORTING (512) 450-0342

1 MR. PREWITT: I second. MR. TREVIÑO: Member Prewitt. 2 Any further discussion? 3 4 (No response.) 5 MR. TREVIÑO: Hearing none, I would call for 6 the vote. All those in favor, please signify by raising 7 your right hand. (A show of hands.) 8 9 MR. TREVIÑO: And it looks like unanimous. Any 10 nays, same sign. 11 (No response.) MR. TREVIÑO: Motion carries unanimously. 12 13 Thank you very much. 14 MR. KUNTZ: Thank you, Board members. With 15 that, I am signing off. MR. TREVIÑO: What? 16 17 MR. KUNTZ: I'll still be here; you won't have my video anymore. 18 MR. TREVIÑO: Great. But there will be a 19 20 Jeremiah Kuntz podcast available later for viewing and listening, so please be aware of that. 21 22 We'll now move to agenda item 12.A, presented 23 by Sandra Menjivar-Suddeath. 24 Sandra, how are you? 25 MS. MENJIVAR-SUDDEATH: I'm good. ON THE RECORD REPORTING (512) 450-0342

Good morning, Board members. For the record, 1 2 Sandra Menjivar Suddeath, Internal Audit director, and I'm 3 presenting item 12.A, which is on page 182 of your board 4 book.

Item 12.A is an action item. We are requesting 6 that the Board delegate authority to the executive director for the execution of the co-source internal audit 8 services contract.

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9 To give you some background information, over 10 the past year Internal Audit has been working with the Information Technology Services Division to develop and 11 better align our projects and our audits to provide more 12 13 assurance on the information security program, which is a 14 pretty critical support area in our agency.

15 Through those conversations we identified 16 specific audits that could be done, and those are 17 documented in the cybersecurity roadmap; however, some of those audits require specific tools, skill sets, or being 18 19 done in a specific time frame that the Internal Audit 20 staff could not potentially do, and so to address that, we 21 came up with the idea of doing a co-source contract or a 22 request for proposal.

23 Basically a co-source is bringing in a vendor 24 to do the day-to-day audit work; however, Internal Audit 25 would still oversee the audit, manage it, make sure that

it's meeting the audit standards that need to be met, as 1 2 well as making sure that it keeps up with the level of 3 expectations from the department and the Board. So because the contract is for an initial term 4 5 of one year with three renewals and a potential estimate 6 cost of no more than \$280,000, we are requesting approval 7 from the Board to delegate the authority to the executive 8 director. 9 With that, I am open for any questions, and if not, I request approval. 10 MR. TREVIÑO: Great. Thank you, Ms. Menjivar-11 Suddeath. And you have run this by the Finance and Audit 12 Committee? 13 14 MS. MENJIVAR-SUDDEATH: Yes. T've had 15 conversations with the Finance and Audit Committee chair 16 about this contract, and there is money specifically in 17 cybersecurity that we will be using for this contract. MR. TREVIÑO: Member Graham, any comments? 18 19 (No response.) 20 MR. TREVIÑO: Great. Thank you. 21 MR. PREWITT: Stacey has one. 22 MR. TREVIÑO: Okay. Member Gillman. 23 MS. GILLMAN: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. 24 I would just say Sandra does a great job, and I 25 think this is a good idea. You know, after an audit you ON THE RECORD REPORTING (512) 450-0342

may get a great score or you might get a less than stellar 1 2 score, and so the follow-up after the audit can be some of the most time-consuming, labor-intense items to try and 3 correct the things that you find in the audit. And so I 4 5 applaud Sandra in her efforts to improve her department's 6 area, and so I think that's great. Thank you, Sandra. 7 8 Thank you, Board Member MS. MENJIVAR-SUDDEATH: 9 Gillman. 10 MR. TREVIÑO: Thank you, Member Gillman for those comments, and I think you speak for everybody on the 11 Board with those comments. 12 13 Any other questions or comments for Ms. 14 Menjivar-Suddeath? 15 (No response.) MR. TREVIÑO: Great. Hearing none, the chair 16 17 would entertain a motion. MR. GRAHAM: Am I live now? Sorry, I was muted 18 19 a while ago. Can you hear me okay? MR. TREVIÑO: You're live. Yes, sir, Member 20 Graham. 21 22 MR. GRAHAM: Thank you. I'll move to authorize 23 the agency's executive director or her designee to 24 negotiate and execute the co-source internal audit 25 contract. ON THE RECORD REPORTING (512) 450-0342

MR. TREVIÑO: Great. We have a motion from 1 2 Member Graham. 3 Do we have a second? MR. PREWITT: I'll second. 4 5 MR. TREVIÑO: Member Prewitt. Second from 6 Member Prewitt. Any further discussion? 7 8 (No response.) 9 MR. TREVIÑO: Hearing none, I call for the 10 vote. All those in favor, please signify by raising your right hand. 11 (A show of hands.) 12 MR. TREVIÑO: And it looks like we've got nine 13 14 votes. Motion carries unanimously. 15 All those opposed, same sign. 16 (No response.) 17 MR. TREVIÑO: I don't see any. Motion carries unanimously, nine for. 18 19 Again, Ms. Menjivar-Suddeath, thanks a lot for 20 all the great work you're doing, and also your flexibility in maintaining the safety and soundness of this 21 22 organization in very unusual times. 23 MS. MENJIVAR-SUDDEATH: Thank you, Chairman. 24 MR. TREVIÑO: Okay. So we will now move to 25 agenda item number 12.B, presented by Linda Flores and Mr. ON THE RECORD REPORTING (512) 450-0342

1 Jimmy Archer.

2	MS. FLORES: Good morning, everyone. For the
3	record, Linda Flores, chief financial officer for the
4	Texas Department of Motor Vehicles. And co-presenting is
5	Jimmy Archer, the director of Motor Carrier Division.
6	Item 12.B is an action item requesting approval
7	form the Board to create a new capital line item in the
8	department's FY 2020 budget. It will be financed by a
9	Federal Motor Carrier Safety grant, and it provides for
10	the upgrade of the department's online registration of
11	commercial vehicles engaged in interstate operations for
12	the Texas International Registration Plan.
13	We are asking the Board to approve this new
14	capital line item since it is not reflected in the
15	department's current appropriations. The funding for the
16	project is \$1,290,000 with a state match of \$193,500,
17	which is in the agency's current budget.
18	With that, I'll turn it over to Jimmy to see if
19	he has any remarks for this project.
20	MR. ARCHER: Thank you, Linda. For the record,
21	Jimmy Archer, director of the Motor Carrier Division.
22	I would urge the Board to approve this, because
23	we've been seeking to upgrade the IRP system for quite a
24	while. The software we're on now, the system was built in
25	2005, so it's 15 years old, and it will be more customer-
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friendly and offer more self-registration and self-service 1 2 for customers, and I ask the Board to approve. 3 And I'll answer any questions if you have any. 4 Thank you. 5 MR. TREVIÑO: Yes. 6 MR. BACARISSE: Jimmy, just curious. Member 7 Bacarisse here. How fast are the feds going to send the 8 money down to the state and to the department? What is 9 the timing on that federal grant coming in and how fast 10 will you be able to make the spend and acquire what we 11 need? 12 MR. ARCHER: Thank you, Mr. Bacarisse. For the 13 record, Jimmy Archer. 14 The money was granted in February of 2019; we 15 have until September 30 of 2023 to spend it all. It's 16 actually a reimbursement grant, so we'll have to spend the 17 money, and then we will submit reimbursements to the feds. We anticipate we can get this system done, we're hoping, 18 19 between 18 to 24 months, so I think we're well within the time frame. 20 21 MR. TREVIÑO: Great. Thank you, Member 22 Bacarisse, for that question 23 Member Graham. 24 MR. GRAHAM: I just wanted to add that it's a 25 great opportunity for us and the Motor Carrier Division, ON THE RECORD REPORTING (512) 450-0342

and with the majority of this being funded by the 1 2 government, assuming there's any dollars left when this 3 thing gets over, it will be great. There's never a 4 no-brainer, but it's pretty close, and so I'll make a 5 motion if you're ready, Mr. Chairman. 6 MR. TREVIÑO: Any other questions for Mr. 7 Archer or Ms. Flores? 8 (No response.) 9 MR. TREVIÑO: Hearing none, Member Graham, 10 please take the initiative, keep on rolling with that. 11 Great. 12 MR. GRAHAM: You got it. I move that the Board 13 approve the creation of a new capital line item in the 14 fiscal year 2020 budget financed by the 2019 Innovative 15 Technology Deployment Grant awarded by the Federal Motor 16 Carrier Safety Administration to provide for the upgrade 17 of the department's online registration of commercial vehicles engaged in interstate operations for the Texas 18 International Registration Plan. 19 20 MR. TREVIÑO: We've got a motion from Member 21 Graham. 22 Do we have a second? Member McRae. 23 MR. PREWITT: Second. 24 MS. McRAE: Second. 25 MR. TREVIÑO: Beat you to it, Member Prewitt. ON THE RECORD REPORTING (512) 450-0342

Thank you, Member McRae. 1 2 Any further discussion? 3 (No response.) MR. TREVIÑO: Hearing none, I would call for a 4 5 vote. All those in favor, please signify by raising your 6 right hand. 7 (A show of hands.) MR. TREVIÑO: Motion carries unanimously. 8 9 Anybody against, please same sign. 10 (No response.) MR. TREVIÑO: There doesn't appear to be any, 11 so the motion passes unanimously. 12 Thank you, Ms. Flores, for everything that 13 14 you're doing. 15 Mr. Archer, thank you very much for everything you do to keep trucks on the roads of Texas and a lifeline 16 17 to this country. We can't thank you enough. You know, they did mention the oversize and 18 19 overweight permits. Do you want to comment on how that's evolving and fallout, rise, anything you would like to 20 comment on? 21 22 MR. ARCHER: Sure. We submitted some 23 information to Whitney yesterday, but basically we've seen 24 at least a 20 percent drop-off in phone calls to the 25 department for motor carrier permits and about a 10 ON THE RECORD REPORTING (512) 450-0342

1 percent decrease right now.

-	percent accrease right new.
2	I don't think all of that is due to the COVID
3	crisis, I think more of it is due to the drop in the West
4	Texas intermediate crude price. So there's a little bit
5	of a slowdown in the oil patch, but our permit numbers are
6	still pretty good.
7	MR. TREVIÑO: Great. Thank you very much, Mr.
8	Archer. But it is going to be a great reminder for how
9	our economy is going to run in this crisis, so we would
10	like to get frequent updates from you on how that's all
11	evolving, if you don't mind.
12	MR. ARCHER: Happy to do that. Thank you.
13	MR. TREVIÑO: Thank you very much.
14	We now move on to agenda item 12.C, presented
15	by Linda Flores and Ann Pierce.
16	MS. FLORES: Good morning. Again for the
17	record, Linda Flores, chief financial officer for the
18	department. And with me is Ann Pierce. She is the
19	assistant director for Finance and Administrative
20	Services, and she will be co-presenting.
21	The next two leases found on page 221 of your
22	board book fall within her area of management, so Ann will
23	be here to address any questions you may have about the
24	commercial leases.
25	Item 12.C is requesting again, another Board
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action item -- to approve the department to executive two five-year contract renewals for both Waco and Fort Worth regional service centers. The Waco lease is effective from September 1, 2020 to August 31, 2025, and the Fort Worth lease is effective October 1, 2020 through September 30, 2025.

We do have some pictures in your board book if you'd like to take a look at the regional service centers. Waco begins on page 224. The property is located at 2203 Austin Avenue, Waco, Texas. It's approximately 2,300 square feet, and the total cost for the five-year lease is \$209,131.80. We house approximately six FTEs at that location.

The Fort Worth location is almost twice the size of Waco. It is located at 2425 Brammel Road, Fort Worth, Texas. Its square footage is 5,685, and the fiveyear cost for the Fort Worth lease is \$406,125. At that location we house approximately 18 FTEs at the regional service center.

The department's budget does cover both leases, and we have sufficient funds to process this transaction. I would like to say the Texas Facilities Commission is the actual entity that engages in the commercial lease on our behalf.

And with that, I am available to answer any

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1 questions. 2 MR. TREVIÑO: Thank you, Ms. Flores. 3 Any questions for Ms. Flores or Ms. Pierce? Member Prewitt. 4 5 MR. PREWITT: Yes, Mr. Chairman. 6 In regards to the ongoing study with the 7 driver's license with DPS, as well as the current economic 8 environment, has there been any consideration in looking 9 at what our facility needs could be if DMV does indeed 10 take on the driver's license operations, and then, as 11 well, given the current economic environment, have we 12 considered a possible shorter lease renewal, given the 13 dynamics of the market as well as the situation involving 14 the driver's license? 15 MS. FLORES: Board Member, this is Linda 16 Flores. 17 I know the UT study is taking into account facilities. They have requested a lot of information 18 19 about our regional service centers. I also know that 20 driver's license far exceeds the number of regional 21 offices in the state compared to DMV. Normally we would 22 engage in a ten-year lease, so a five-year lease is, I 23 believe, the least amount of period that the Facilities Commission will entertain. 24 25 MR. PREWITT: Very good. Thank you.

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1	MR. TREVIÑO: Thank you, Member Prewitt.
2	Any other questions?
3	(No response.)
4	MR. TREVIÑO: Great. Hearing none and no
5	comments from the public, the chair would entertain a
6	motion for approval.
7	MR. BACARISSE: Mr. Chairman.
8	MR. TREVIÑO: Yes.
9	MR. BACARISSE: Member Bacarisse, I'd like to
10	make a motion.
11	MR. TREVIÑO: Yes.
12	MR. BACARISSE: On agenda item 12.C, I would
13	like to move to authorize the agency's executive director,
14	or her designee, to negotiate and execute, in conjunction
15	with the Texas Facilities Commission, the contract renewal
16	for the Waco Regional Service Center lease for an
17	additional five-year term, effective September 1, 2020,
18	through August 31, 2025, and the contract renewal for the
19	Fort Worth Regional Service Center lease for an additional
20	five-year term effective October 1, 2020 through September
21	30, 2025.
22	Thank you.
23	MR. TREVIÑO: Thank you, Member Bacarisse.
24	And I misspoke. The chair would entertain a
25	motion, not necessarily a motion for approval, but thank
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you for the motion for approval. 1 2 Do we have a second? 3 MR. GRAHAM: (Inaudible response.) MR. TREVIÑO: Member Graham, second by Member 4 5 Graham. 6 Any further discussion? 7 (No response.) 8 MR. TREVIÑO: Hearing none, the chair would 9 call for the vote. All those in favor, please signify by 10 raising your right hand. (A show of hands.) 11 12 MR. TREVIÑO: And any opposed, same sign. 13 (No response.) 14 MR. TREVIÑO: It looks like the motion passes 15 unanimously. Thank you very much. 16 Next agenda item number 13 presented by Whitney Brewster, executive director. 17 Whitney. 18 19 MS. BREWSTER: Thank you, Mr. Chairman, 20 members. Whitney Brewster, executive director again. 21 I draw your attention to page 231 of your board 22 We're recommending simply to delegate authority to books. 23 the department's executive director to perform the 24 personnel matters around the Board liaison position with 25 input from Board members as well as the department's ON THE RECORD REPORTING (512) 450-0342

1 executive team.

2	And this really is an effort to be more
3	efficient. If this function is delegated to me to perform
4	with your input, we can move forward with doing that. If
5	the Board performs this function, all discussions,
6	deliberations or action must comply with the Texas Open
7	Meetings Act.
8	So in the situation where we are with COVID-19,
9	we though it would be prudent to bring this recommendation
10	to you for your consideration so that we can move forward
11	efficiently with performing the evaluation and any
12	compensation associated with that evaluation for the Board
13	liaison position.
14	In our upcoming Board meetings we will propose
15	another process that doesn't delegate the authority to me
16	for all of our direct reports to the Board, but for right
17	now, with the situation, again, being kind of complex,
18	what is being recommended is to delegate that to the
19	executive director with input from the Board to perform
20	those functions.
21	And with that, Mr. Chairman, I'd be happy to
22	answer any questions that the Board has.
23	MR. TREVIÑO: Thank you, Executive Director
24	Brewster.
25	Any other comments or questions for Ms.
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1 Brewster?

2	Member Graham.
3	MR. GRAHAM: So is this temporary or permanent?
4	MS. BREWSTER: Member Graham, I talked about
5	the evaluations coming up, for instance, Sandra as well as
6	mine, we'll be coming forward with a different process for
7	that, because the Internal Audit position and the
8	executive director position are statutorily mentioned as
9	direct reports to the Board, the Board liaison is not, and
10	that is why for right now for these circumstances we are
11	making this particular recommendation; however, a
12	different recommendation will be coming forward in the
13	near future on all Board direct reports.
14	MR. GRAHAM: So permanent. Just making sure I
15	understand correctly.
16	MS. BREWSTER: This is not a permanent
17	proposal, sir. This would be a temporary proposal so we
18	can go ahead and move forward with the evaluation of the
19	Board liaison. We will be coming forward with a new
20	process perhaps in the next Board meeting, if the chairman
21	is agreeable, to bring forward a different process.
22	MR. GRAHAM: Thank you.
23	MR. TREVIÑO: Thanks for the question, Member
24	Graham, it's a great one.
25	And I would like to compliment Executive
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Director Brewster for being flexible and trying to find
 ways to make sure that the day-to-day operations of this
 enterprise continue.

4 And if anyone has any concerns about any of 5 these temporary measures that we're putting in place, 6 please feel free to either speak up in this meeting or 7 contact Executive Director Brewster or myself, because we 8 definitely do not want to change any of the governance 9 structure, we don't want to change any of the oversight 10 that we need going forward, but we have to continue to operate and more of this will be coming down the line 11 12 here, unless by some miracle it ends tomorrow. 13 So with that, any other comments for Ms. 14 Brewster, questions? 15 (No response.) MR. TREVIÑO: Great. Hearing none, the chair 16 17 would entertain a motion. MS. McRAE: Chairman, I'd like to make the 18 19 motion. Member McRae. 20 I move that the Board appoint the department's executive director to perform all personnel matters 21 22 regarding the Board liaison position. 23 MR. TREVIÑO: Thank you, Member McRae. 24 Is there a second? Member Washburn. 25 MS. WASHBURN: Member Washburn. I second. ON THE RECORD REPORTING (512) 450-0342

MR. TREVIÑO: Thank you. 1 2 Motion by Member McRae and a second by Member 3 Washburn. Any further discussion? 4 5 (No response.) 6 MR. TREVIÑO: Hearing none, I would call for 7 the vote. All those in favor, please signify by raising 8 your right hand. 9 (A show of hands.) 10 MR. TREVIÑO: And all those opposed, same sign. (No response.) 11 MR. 1 regarding that grant with the motion again so we can 2 record the vote, unless you have the vote recorded. 3 MR. TREVIÑO: I do, but out of an abundance of 4 caution I think we should take it again. These are 5 unusual times; we don't want any concerns, especially if 6 they're raised by general counsel. 7 So we'll go back to agenda item number 12.B, 8 presented by Linda Flores and Jimmy Archer. I believe 9 Member Graham made a motion. Do you still have that 10 motion and are you wanting to make that again? MR. GRAHAM: Yes, I will, I'll be glad to make 11 12 that motion again. I move that the Board approve the creation of a 13 14 new capital line item in the fiscal year 2020 budget, 15 financed by the Innovative Technology Deployment Grant 16 awarded by the Federal Motor Carrier Safety 17 Administration, to provide for the upgrade of the department's online registration of commercial vehicles 18 19 engaged in interstate operations through the Texas International Registration Plan. 20 21 Thank you, Member Graham. MR. TREVIÑO: 22 And I did not record who seconded, though. 23 MS. McRAE: Member McRae. 24 MR. TREVIÑO: Member McRae, thank you very 25 much. ON THE RECORD REPORTING (512) 450-0342

And with that, I will call for the vote. All 1 2 those in favor, please signify by raising your right hand. 3 (A show of hands.) MR. TREVIÑO: And any opposed, same sign. 4 5 (No response.) 6 MR. TREVIÑO: It looks like the motion carries 7 unanimously, that's nine-zero. Motion by Member Graham, 8 second by Member McRae, and a unanimous vote. 9 General Counsel Beaver, have you got all that? 10 MS. BREWSTER: Tracey Beaver, general counsel, for the record. Yes. Thank you so much. 11 MR. TREVIÑO: Thank you for pointing that out. 12 13 This is a difficult process to manage. 14 So we're moving on now. No executive session, 15 that takes care of several items there. 16 General Counsel Beaver, do we have any comments 17 from the public? MS. BEAVER: Tracey Beaver, general counsel, 18 19 for the record. I'm doing a quick check, and we have not 20 21 received any requests to provide public comment through 22 the GCO email box; we do not have any folks requesting to 23 provide public comment today. 24 MR. TREVIÑO: Well, thank you very much, 25 General Counsel Beaver. ON THE RECORD REPORTING (512) 450-0342

9 So the fact that we were able to do the Pledge 10 of Allegiance to our country and to our state, I know 11 they're relatively small things but they do remind us, 12 they're visible reminders, we have to get up and we have 13 to pledge allegiance to our country, to all those people 14 all over the country that we don't touch or see -- we're 15 not touching anybody anymore -- but that we don't see on a 16 daily basis but their lives are in our hands and we, at 17 our own peril, forget that.

And so I would, again, like to thank Jeremiah 18 19 and his son Parker for leading us in that and reminding us 20 through trying times that the things that we do every 21 single day -- that we were doing every single day, that 22 were part of our routine and everything else have real 23 meaning, and thanks again for that, Jeremiah and Parker. 24 MR. KUNTZ: Absolutely. We were so glad to do 25 it this morning. Glad we could make it happen.

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MR. TREVIÑO: Thank you, thank you. 1 2 So with that, I guess we don't have any comments from the public, so that leads us to agenda item 3 number 17, always a crowd favorite, so the chair would 4 5 entertain a motion for adjournment. 6 Before that, General Counsel Beaver, do we have 7 any other issues before this Board? 8 MS. BEAVER: Tracey Beaver, general counsel, 9 for the record. 10 No, Chairman. That concludes the agenda items for today. 11 12 MR. TREVIÑO: Great. Thank you very much. So with that, the chair would entertain a 13 14 motion for adjournment. Nobody is jumping up? 15 MS. WASHBURN: I move to adjourn. 16 MR. TREVIÑO: Member Washburn, thank you for 17 jumping in there and taking the initiative. Second? 18 19 MS. GILLMAN: Second. MR. TREVIÑO: Member Gillman, stepping up. 20 21 Thank you. 22 So all those in favor? 23 (A show of hands.) 24 MR.
